

PLANNING AND INFRASTRUCTURE BILL

The core purpose of the Planning and Infrastructure Bill is to make house building easier by allowing developers to pay money to Natural England – instead of dealing with protected species and habitats on development sites themselves.

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NOTES FROM THE JULY PARISH COUNCIL MEETING

Local Government Reorganisation consultations: for everyone to respond to the consultations. Options for Unitaries now on the table are:

- 1. Proposals from 12 Councils for four mainland unitaries which includes a 'Northern Hants' Unitary comprising BDBC, Hart and Rushmoor. See: www.basingstoke.gov.uk/future-councils
- 2. Proposal from County and East Hants for three mainland unitaries. See: www.hants.gov.uk/lgr

New rules for Parish Council meetings Government is to amend legislation to enable remote and hybrid meetings. Agreed that face-toface meetings would continue as the norm for Mapledurwell & Up Nately, .

Playground Annual inspection completed – no issues for action.

S106 funding for new play equipment – £3,447 available for 'children's play enhancement, improving accessibility and quality of the provision'.

Proposal for a 'games den' from play equipment provider meets BDBC criteria and the funds available; not supported by the Parish Council.

Agreed that provision for a mix of ages and for families is needed. Outdoor table tennis table is the preferred option – sited beyond the old car park beside the playground; to also consider a new site the basket ball hoop outside the tennis courts.

Tennis courts – Parish Council inspection... Surface is playable although the bounce generally not good. There is one area in particular where weed are growing into the surface. Week killing arranged for this area and perimeters of the court. To purchase a couple of yard brushes to leave in the courts.

Future use - suggestions:

- For a pickleball court
- For the courts to have open access, including to the basket ball net
- For residents from outside the parish to play for a fee – potentially certain days/evenings.

Old car park To finish clearing mud from the surface. Waiting to hear from the Community Payback team.

Allotments – All plots taken and being worked on. Footpath gatepost (Frog Lane) on jobs list to be fixed.

Chalk stream Water flow down to a trickle given the weather.

Next Parish Council meetingWednesday 17 Sept 7pm all welcome.

MAPLEDURWELL FIELDS AND FOOTPATHS – DOG MESS

With hay making and harvest underway we have noticed an increase in the amount of dog faeces left in the fields and on footpaths.

Please be aware that worms from dog faeces can cause:

- Illness in children and vulnerable adults.
- Illness in livestock, including abortions in cattle and death in sheep.

It can affect pasture, animal feed (hay), water and bedding (straw) and the eggs can stay active for months.

Please could villages help by:

- Worming your dog regularly; take advice from your vet.
- Pick up after your dog: BAG IT, TAKE IT, BIN IT.

These fields are growing YOUR FOOD so please pick up after your dogs.

VILLAGE HALL GROUNDS PLEASE PICK UP AFTER YOUR DOG

IT IS NOT THE JOB OF OTHER LOCAL RESIDENTS TO DO THIS FOR YOU

Nor should Parish precept funds have to be used for CCTV or a dog warden which seems to be the alternatives.

The recreation ground is covered by BDBC bylaws; failing to clean up after your dog is subject to £100 fixed penalty as per the BDBC Public Spaces Protection Order (Dec 2023).

PLANNING AND INFRASTRUCTURE BILL

'The UK Government promised to protect and restore nature. But a year in, new planning laws are set to weaken environmental protections and create a "cash to trash" system. [Developers can pay the environment agency to allow them to destroy habitat as the norm rather than a last resort.]

'Thank you to everyone who emailed their MP and co-signed The Wildlife Trusts' open letter urging the Government to rethink Part 3 of the Planning and Infrastructure Bill. Over 32,000 messages were sent — a powerful show of public support that helped spark cross-party pressure for change.

'The Government has now proposed a series of changes to the Bill. This is a testament to the campaigning we and others have been doing for the last few months. But we are not done yet.

'These amendments are a good first step. They introduce stronger tests, backup measures where conservation efforts fall short, requirements for transparency, and a welcome expectation that compensation be delivered locally. However, while these changes make the Bill a little less harmful, they do not deal with the fundamental problem at the heart of it and which makes it easy for nature and wildlife to be destroyed.



'At its core, Part 3 of the Bill unravels decades of environmental safeguards. It bypasses the long-established mitigation hierarchy, which rightly requires developers to first avoid harm to wildlife and habitats, then minimise that harm; and only as a last resort, and if there are overriding reasons, compensate for any loss.

'This hierarchy is not red tape – it's a fundamental principle of responsible development. It's how we ensure that nature isn't simply brushed aside in the name of progress. Blame for slow development is placed on wildlife when evidence shows this isn't true.

'All the amendments do is improve the certainty that EDPs will deliver what they are supposed to – ignoring the fact that compensation is only required because the Bill makes it easier to destroy nature. Without the mitigation hierarchy on the face of the Bill, developers are forced to leapfrog straight to compensation.

'It sends a clear signal: it's acceptable to destroy habitats and species, so long as you pay for it.

'The Office for Environmental Protection has sounded the alarm, warning that without the mitigation hierarchy embedded in law, even highly protected sites could be permanently damaged or lost. In its latest response to the Government's changes yesterday, the OEP was unequivocal: even after the amendments, the Bill would still reduce environmental protection.

'The Planning and Infrastructure Bill, as it stands, is still regressive. It seeks to make it easier to damage the natural world at a time when we should be doing everything in our power to restore it. That is why Part 3 must be removed. We need your help to speak out for nature, before it's too late.

'Please join with us in saying no to #CashToTrash and calling on the Government to scrap Part 3 of the Planning and Infrastructure Bill.



BDBC will consider TPO requests if the trees are valuable in their own right or as part of the street scene and make a positive contribution to the area – and if evidently under threat.

The tree cover on Scures Hill has in recent years been eroded, in part due to development, and there is potential for more housing. Agreed to investigate the feasibility of a group TPO covering all Scures Hill.

Dear Friends, This is my first editorial for the

parish magazines and, although a real pleasure, I am aware of the big shoes I am trying to walk in!

By way of introduction to those I have not yet met in person, I am Luke Augustyn, Assistant Curate in the North Hampshire Downs Benefice. My family and I arrived in July last year and it is my joy to serve specifically our congregations and communities in Greywell, Up Nately and Mapledurwell.

I was ordained Deacon at the end of June 2024 and just recently, ordained Priest. During one of our pre-Priesting retreat reflections, we mused on what it means to be a good pastor...

As I sit down now to write, I have just moments ago come away from putting our sons to bed and our sofa cushions have only just been reassembled by my ever-sprinting-around-the-house wife after the boys' trapeze antics of earlier. 

FOOD WASTE COLLECTIONS FROM OCTOBER 2025

From BDBC press release 10645 published 14 July

'Basingstoke & Deane Borough Council and Hart District Council will introduce food waste collections w/c Mon 06 October.

This is ahead of the Government's mandatory deadline of April 2026.

'All households will be provided with:

- one gray indoor caddy
- a roll of liners
- an information leaflet to help use the service.

'Households who have kerbside wheelie bin collections will also receive a green outdoor caddy.

'When the new service starts, the food waste caddies are to be put out each week with other bins on the usual collection day.

'All food can be put out for recycling - fruit and vegetable peelings, meat and fish and bones and shells, tea bags, eggshells, pet food and all leftover food and plate scrapings - to become greener energy and fertiliser'.

While the Borough / District Councils are responsible for waste collection. the County Council is responsible for disposal and recyling.

Hampshire County Council has agreed to the increased food waste recycling, reference their 'Universal Services' Decision Day of 23 June: www.hants.gov.uk/News/20250623F oodwasterecyclying

'Plans to recycle household food waste from April 2026 have been confirmed... HCC will proceed with arrangements that will see c30K to 50K tonnes of food waste recycled through anaerobic digestion...'

'Following in-depth assessments, 12 councils are working together and believe creating four unitary councils for mainland Hampshire would best meet the Government's criteria.


'Three variations of this option are being considered, but all include a 'Northern Unitary' comprising Basingstoke & Deane, Hart and Rushmoor.'
